The Llandyssil Show Fund

Some of our younger readers and recent incomers to the village may not know about this local tradition so it is worth putting on record. It is a tradition which started some decades ago when Llandyssil's annual Village Show became unsustainable, and for many years -- until the Dragonfest revived our annual fun and fund-raising get-together -- we were without an annual celebration. When the Village Show ceased it was agreed by the organisers that the balance of monies remaining should be banked as a charity and the interest shared annually among the oldest members in the community.

This echoes the Queen's Royal Maundy which is an annual event on the Thursday before Good Friday when the Queen -at a location of her choice -- distributes token coins to the elderly of that place. The tradition originates from the New Testament and the name -- maundy -- is a contraction of the Latin 'mandatum' (= command) and refers to Christ's command to his disciples to show that they were the servants of the people by the act of washing their feet. The monarch no longer washes her subjects' feet but distributes small coinage to an equal number of men and women -- the number of each being equivalent to the queen's age. So this year on Thursday 29th March the Queen will distribute small coinage to 92 elderly men and 92 elderly women.

It is not, of course, the amount distributed that signifies. What is important is the gesture of recognition to the elderly that their role in the community is still valued. As one of the happy octogenarian recipients of the Llandyssil Show Fund proceeds I would like to place on record my appreciation of this local tradition -- and to thank Wyn Ralph for distributing it! **John Billington**

As you read this the marking of Christmas in the Christian calendar will be coming to an end with the Presentation of Christ on 2^{nd} February. There will be no church service to mark the event this year, but I am hoping to get my Christmas decorations down by then!

I am aware that for many Christmas festivities this year has been difficult due to bereavement or illness. If you are one of those then the next festival on 14th February may better suit your mood; no not Valentines day but Ash Wednesday which fall on the 14th this year. There will be 2 opportunities across the 3 parishes to mark the occasion by receiving the sign of the cross in ashes on your forehead or hand. Covering oneself in ash is an ancient sign of mourning and of regret. The cross the symbol of Christ's death, the festival towards which the period of Lent, heralded in by Ash Wednesday leads us. If during the Christmas season you got partied out, or your circumstances made it difficult to be surrounded by a gaiety you could not feel or some the energy to take part in, than anticipate Lent as a time of R&R - rest and recuperation: A time to reflect and reminisce, to recoup and recapture, to refocus and to (quietly) rejoice.

In November we completed the new lighting project in the church. All the connections were changed, enabling us to then have LED bulbs installed which has resulted in a much improved lighting system. The total cost of the project was £3,300 and we extend our grateful thanks to anyone who contributed towards the finance in any way.

On 26th November the ordination of Dr. Alexis Smith took place in church. The ceremony was attended by approximately 100 people. She was ordained as priest to the Pool mission area.

The Carol Service on 20th December was well attended by 40 adults and 6 children. This was followed on Xmas eve by a Eucharist service at 6:30 pm attended by approximately 26 people.

A Coffee Morning is provisionally arranged for 19th May with the proceeds going towards a new boiler in the church. We experienced major problems in November with the current boiler so we therefore need to explore the cost of a new one.

Remembrance Day Service 2018

As you all know, 2018 will be 100 years since the end of the first World War.

Each year, the names of those who lost their lives in this war are read out at our Remembrance Service in Abermule Community Centre. Llandyssil Walking Group

Farms Of Llandyssil Parish (Part 2)

Fronfraith

At the time of the tithe award the Fronfraith estate, just over 295 acres, comprised Fronfraith, Bronywood and Cwmbadarn farms, some woodland, Fronfraith mill with associated land, as well as some dwellings with gardens and a malt house and kiln near Llandyssil village.

Once home to Richard Morgan (M.P. for Montgomery Boroughs 1592-3) and his wife (Margaret, daughter of Thomas Lloyd of Gwernybuarth), Fronfraith passed to the Jones family in the 18th century. In view of his long and distinguished service in the Royal Navy (summarised on a fine memorial in Montgomery Church), it is unlikely that Rear Admiral Sir Charles Thomas Jones, owner in the early Victorian era, spent much time at Fronfraith. At the time of the 1861 census, his son, Maurice, was living in Fronfraith Lodge, as the half-timbered mansion was probably in a poor state of repair. Starting about 1863, Shrewsbury architect, James Pickard, oversaw construction of a new mansion house which became home to Maurice and his family by 1868. A family dispute followed and an order of Court of Chancery forced the sale of Fronfraith. Maurice and his family were in the Lodge again when the 1871 census was taken.

Charles Whitley Owen acquired Fronfraith before the 1891 census was taken, and he and his family soon became respected as local benefactors. My mother recalls attending their tea parties for Dolforwyn school pupils in the 1920s, and Dolforwyn School log book records numerous examples of their generosity to pupils over several decades. Fronfraith was in the hands of Canadian politician and newspaper editor, Welshpoolborn Senator Rupert Davies in 1930s and 1940s. After that it was owned by Humphreys family of Llwynmadoc. The house and surrounding grounds were sold in 1969 and the current owners offer holiday accommodation.

The estate of John Browne Esq

Llandyssil parish' third largest estate at the start of the Victorian era was that owned by John Browne, Esq. As my research to date has not shed light on his identity, I will be pleased to hear from any readers who are able to add any information. His lands in the parish comprised White Hall, a farm of 194 acres occupied by John Stephens, and Black Hall, where Richard Bumford farmed 921¹/₂ acres.

The Stephens family was at White Hall when the 1841, 1851 and 1861 censuses were taken. Farmer David Ralph headed the household there at the time of the 1871 and 1881 censuses. Trefeglwys-born Thomas Jones and his family were there when the 1891 census was taken but had moved to Gwernybuarth before the next census. Thomas Bayliss and his family were at White Hall when the 1901 and 1911 censuses were taken. The Bumford family was at Black Hall at the time of the 1841, 1851, 1861, 1871 and 1881 censuses. In 1891, Thomas Mitchel was the farmer at Black Hall, and Edward Owen was there when the 1901 and 1911 censuses were taken. **Annie Owen**

The new year began with several events that show there is more need than ever to live sustainably. The first and closest to home is the sad news that Cae Post recycling project has been forced to close. Cae Post made an enormous contribution both in practical recycling action and in helping people who are disadvantaged in the labour market. Cae Post has a close association with the area through Phil (Pip) Picken, Richard Tanner and others. Trustees are now seeking new initiatives so that they can continue to provide employment opportunities for disadvantaged people.

Finally, further from home but also significant, is the news that China will no longer accept scrap plastic from the UK, meaning that the UK has to start dealing with its own waste, as it ought to be doing anyway. Indeed, when Cae Post Recycling started, all the plastic was reprocessed and remanufactured in Lancashire. Now waste is building up in warehouses around the UK as we no longer have the facilities to treat it ourselves. All the more reason to redouble efforts to reduce the amount of unnecessary packaging and other single use plastic that we consume and discard.
