The file we have submitted includes as many aspects as we could manage in the time allowed. The file has been checked and added to by all groups using the hall. It includes history of the surrounding area, the old church, flora and fauna as well as walks and what we would like for the future.

Many people have been involved in the production of the file and they are all named (hopefully) in the section 'Unsung heroes and heroines'. The file has been shown to many members of the community, with any requisite changes and updates made.

- Judging will be from May to August
- Finalists will be contacted in August when the judges will want to speak to members of our community

There is a separate competition for a map of the village produced by young people in the village. This has a different submission date and those involved know the deadline for this.

With the Village of the Year competition in mind, we should like to remind all dog owners to clean up after their dog. If you don't, you can be given an on-the-spot fine. This is often £50 but can be as high as £80. If you refuse to pay the fine you can be taken to court and fined up to £1,000. Dog mess is a nuisance and it's associated with numerous diseases, including toxocara canis; a roundworm found in dogs. Roundworm eggs are found in dog mess, which can easily be picked up by young children. This causes stomach upsets, sore throats, asthma and in rare cases blindness.

Be a responsible dog owner and clean-up after your dog. There are plenty of bins around the village - please use them.

The coffee mornings are a real community event and raise much needed funds for the Hall - **the last 2 years have raised over £2,000**. Key points from Village Hall meeting 22nd February 2018

Finances

Excluding any income from Dragonfest, the Hall is basically covering its annual costs of around £7,000 per annum from grants, rental income/fund raising events eg. coffee mornings, the village lottery and

solar. The Trust currently has around £0,000 in the bank. A full financial report will be given at the AGM on Thursday 24th May.

Investment Options

One of the Trustees' responsibilities is to ensure that available funds are prudently invested. It was therefore decided by a unanimous vote, including the four trustees present, that up to £15,000 should be invested - £13,000 immediately and £2,000 when an environmentally and socially acceptable project arises which benefits the local community and meets the investment criteria. Not allowing for continuing income this leaves £5-7,000 in the bank to cover regular costs.

AGM

The AGM of the Llandyssil Community Charitable Trust which manages the Llandyssil Old School Hall will be held on Thursday 24th May at 7:30. Everyone is welcome, so do please come along.

It's ten years since the Trust was first formed and various adjustments to the Constitution and supporting policies are required to meet current standards. These, along with the Hall Hiring Agreement, will be tabled at the AGM for approval.

Future Projects

Please come to the Hall AGM on 24th May to give us your ideas. Suggestions so far received include:

- Christmas tree on the green outside the pub
- Linking the Hall to the internet to provide WiFi access to Hall users and enable computer help classes to be held. Sadly village halls are deemed commercial premises, incurring much higher costs than domestic premises, so this looks unlikely.
- Storage shed on Dragon field

It was proposed and agreed to establish a register of those who are willing to be called upon to give local lifts to or obtain urgent groceries for the elderly or infirm, or those suffering illness in Llandyssil. This includes

those who do not have cars or are unable to get about eg. to the surgery in Montgomery or obtain urgent groceries due to lack of mobility, ill health or family at work etc.

MEG - Montgomery Energy Group

The April MEG meeting was about electric cars, with a presentation by Tony Webster, a local man who works in this rapidly expanding industry. The meeting is due to take place after this piece is written, but before the newsletter is published, we will write a report on it for next time, and hopefully some of you may have attended.

At the March meeting, members of MEG discussed what they wanted to focus attention on in 2019. One area of much interest is reducing plastic use. This topic has had a lot of national publicity in the past year, with revelations about the massive size of the accumulation of plastic waste in the centre of the pacific ocean (the Great Pacific Garbage Patch), and the damage that plastic waste is doing to marine life. Lots of people across the UK are looking to find ways to reduce the amount of "single use" plastic we allow ourselves to accept. MEG will be looking for and supporting activities to encourage this.

One way to reduce this is to buy milk in glass bottles - Montgomery Spar has just started stocking milk in glass bottles, please support them in this so that they are able to continue this service.

We had to postpone our Repair Cafe from March because of the snow, we will be rescheduling this shortly, if you want to be kept notified of this and other MEG activities, make sure you are on our email list by sending a request to jeremy.thorp@gmail.com

We will also be focussing on the savings you can make by converting to LED bulbs. At our last meeting, David Wilson gave us a demonstration of the brightness and low power usage of the latest generation of LED bulbs, and the costs have come down considerably. It now makes

financial sense, and saves a lot of carbon, to convert even compact fluorescent bulbs (curly bulbs) to LEDs. We will be helping people in Montgomery and Llandyssil to understand the options you have now with LED bulbs.

Our meetings are always on the third Monday of the Month, at 7:30pm in Montgomery Activity Centre, Everyone is welcome.

Llandyssil Walking Group

In March we had an unusually high turn-out of 17 walkers from the village, Montgomery, Berriew and Kerry, to walk what will become known as the "Peter Warlock Trail". This circuit takes in Goron-ddu, the Green Field burial site (adjacent to the 20th Century composer Peter Warlock's home, Cefn Bryntalch Hall) and returns to Llandyssil via Upper Bryntalch farm and the spring at Fron Wyllt, the route Peter Warlock took when he walked to Llandyssil church to play the organ there. A leaflet describing this circular walk is currently under preparation and should soon be available on our notice-board and in our Telephone Kiosk info site. I'm grateful to Brett and Jill Kibble for their help. Another circular walk and leaflet are in preparation for the circuit taking in Gwernybuarth, Fronheulog and Fron Fraith Lodge and we hope to add to this as our contribution to the Walkers are Welcome (WAW) scheme centred in Montgomery.

On 4th April Mike Membery and myself plan a circuit around Pinion, Upper Pentre and White Hall. The walk on 2nd May will probably be a short one via New House, the green lane past the Roundabout and so back to the village. This walk will be of special interest to wild flower enthusiasts and we hope to have an expert with us to identify the many flowers – some rare – which should then be in bloom. A slow walk with many pauses.

On 6th June we will probably do the "Fron Fraith" circuit, outlined above.

We walk on the first Wednesday in every month, leaving from our Bus Shelter at 10am and new walkers are always welcome to join us.

Farms of Llandyssil

Part 3

The histories of the estates ranking 4th and 5th in size in Llandyssil parish at the time of the tithe award bear some similarities as both were purchased in the early nineteenth century by men belonging to significant east Montgomeryshire families who managed them through bailiffs or tenants. By the time of the 1911 census, the main farms, Gwernybuarth and Brynderwen, were occupied by families who, as many readers will know, remained connected with the properties for decades.

The fourth largest estate, the **estate of Dr. Edward Johnes**, comprised Gwernybuarth and some smaller units. An article in *Montgomeryshire Collections* (volume 58) notes that, in 1822, Edward Johnes borrowed most of the money to purchase Gwernybuarth, hoping to make a fortune from planting trees. When the 1841 census was taken, Edward Davies, named as the occupier of Gwenybuarth in the parish tithe award, was listed as head of a household that included his wife and five young children together with five male and two female live-in servants. It is not clear when the Davies family left Gwernybuarth but the census returns of 1851 and 1861 show John Rogers as its farmer. He moved to a farm in Forden before the 1871 census was taken but the 1871 and 1881 census returns show some of his sons were at Gwernybuarth.

By the time of the 1891 census, Gwernybuarth was home to two families of farm servants. Thomas Jones, formerly farmer at White Hall, was listed in 1901 census return as head of a household that included his wife, six children as well as two female and four male live-in servants. By the time of the 1911 census, the Hamer family had moved to Gwernybuarth and most local readers will be able to take the story of Gwernybuarth on to the present day.

About 1815, **David Pugh Esq. of Llanerchydol**, Welshpool, purchased the Grange of Abermule (formerly belonging to Strata Florida Abbey) which comprised The Court, Abermule Inn, Brynderwen and other property. While some of this land was in Llanmerewig parish, that in Llandyssil parish formed the parish's fifth largest estate in the early Victorian era. William Harris headed the household at Brynderwen at the time of the 1841 and 1851 censuses. When the 1861 census was taken, Brynderwen's household was headed by unmarried 29-year-old Margaret Owen, a farmer who employed four labourers and two boys. She married Samuel Miller of The Court in 1868, after which the two farms were

probably run as one unit. In 1871 William Griffiths, an agricultural labourer, and his wife and children lived at Brynderwen, and he was still there when the 1881 and 1891 censuses were taken. However, in both 1881 and 1891, the Moore family, natives of Worcestershire, also lived there.

By 1901 Charles Miller, son to Samuel Miller and Margaret, was at Brynderwen. Research to date has not indicated when the Edwards family arrived in Brynderwen but it was before the 1911 census was taken, and local people will recall their decades-long connection with the farm.
