Llandyssil Walking Group

For the October walk, 15 people enjoyed the 6-mile circuit which passed CwmBadarn, Camp, Cwmberllan, Little Mount and Cefnllan. At Cwmberllan Farm, which is about 3 miles from the village on the Sarn side of Cefn y Coed, we were invited to view the farm's superb brick buildings. The farm has been the home of the Anthony family since 1954, but after almost 70 years it is now on the market. The farm buildings were built about 1860 when the farm had links with the Llandinham estate and part of the Naylor Leyland ownership.

On the day of our visit, the Anthony brothers, who are now all in their seventies, gave us a guided tour of these superb brick-built victorian buildings. The bricks were made on site from clay dug from a nearby field. If you like mature red bricks you will not find a better example. The walls are still perfectly straight and true and there is absolutely no dip in the roofs. I really hope the next owner values the buildings as much as the Anthony family has done. If the history of local farms interests you, then you may like to know that the Sarn Local History Group has a talk on the evening of Tuesday 29th November when the history of Cwmberllan, Gwernygo and other local farms will be discussed.

The next Llandyssil walk will be Wednesday 23rd November. This will be a shorter local walk ending with a pre-Christmas get together. There will not be a village walk in December. In addition to this we are regularly invited to join Montgomery and Berriew walking groups so watch out for news of these. I wonder how many people have made use of the walk display on the end wall of the bus shelter?

Saving Energy in Your Home This Winter

Affording to heat your home is something that will be worrying many people this winter. Fuel prices at the moment are more than double what they were last year. MEG has close links with Lightfoot, a charity based in Bishops Castle that has for many years promoted energy saving in homes, and if you want more individual advice, Lightfoot are happy to talk to you and visit you in your home. They have some funding from PAVO to subsidise their individual home visits - the cost is just £35 for a home visit and written report, or free if you are on a low income. To find out more, contact me on jeremy.brignell-thorp@hotmail.com or phone 07722 722863 and I'll gladly answer any energy-related questions. Some of the key points that are worth knowing are:

 If you have a choice between oil heating and electric heating, the oil will be cheaper. Heat from oil costs around 10p/kWh at the moment, heat from electricity costs about 35p/kWh (unless it is a storage heater that warms up at night). Bottled gas is as expensive as electricity.

- Draughts are a big source of heat loss, and make a cold house even more uncomfortable to live in. You can seal doors and windows with DIY draught strip. Letterboxes can be a bad source of draughts, also check loft hatches.
- If you are struggling with your bills, and your house is hard to heat, you may be eligible for help from the council to improve your house. This is targeted at those with either children or old people in the house, and hard to heat houses, but if you think you might qualify, go to the Warm Wales website https:// www.warmwales.org.uk/ or contact me for more help.
- There are a lot of scam adverts on the internet at the moment about wonderful new electric heaters that cost almost nothing to run. This is complete nonsense, please do not get one. If you want advice on what heaters to get, please contact me and I will give you some advice.

Draught proofing is a DIY job, but not everyone is confident to do it. If you are confident with DIY and would be willing to help someone else in the village with simple draught proofing, please get in touch and we will try to set up a little team to help those who are less able to sort it out themselves.

Devereux Glynne Mytton

Rector of Llandyssil 1807 ~ 1856

While Mytton family history has been traced back to at least the twelfth century, the family links with Montgomeryshire date from the later sixteenth century.

Born in Meifod in 1779, Devereux Mytton was son of a second son and so was not heir to the family's main estate. However, in 1807, he inherited one third of an estate in Carno. Sources shed little light on his early life before he matriculated in 1797. He studied in Brasenose College, Oxford, where he graduated B.A. in 1801 and M.A. in 1804. Inducted as rector of Llandyssil in 1807, he retained that position until his death nearly half a century later.

Rev. Mytton married Elizabeth Sarah Lloyd in Ellesmere in June 1810 and the decade that followed saw the births of two sons and two daughters. As Llandyssil did not have a rectory -- older Llandyssil residents then claiming the previous rectory had burned down in the 1730s – the family lived at Dolarddyn, Castle Caereinion. His 1812 correspondence with Bishop of St. Asaph and Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty secured permission and finance for a new rectory which was built by George Lloyd of Welshpool according to plans prepared by Joseph Bromfield, a Shrewsbury architect. Rev. Mytton and his family probably moved in during the winter of 1813-14. Evidence suggests that from then on Rev. Mytton was resident in Llandyssil parish.

In 1832, Rev. Mytton's answers to a questionnaire for a parliamentary enquiry into the state of the church offer some insight into his work in the parish at that time. His church,

the old church surrounded by the churchyard, was large enough to accommodate about half of his 914 parishioners. As he did not have a curate, it was left to Rev. Mytton to conduct two services every Sunday as well as some on other Holy Days, and to provide pastoral care to his parishioners. In 1832, his net income was £372, but it varied from year to year according to the price of corn. His older son, John, married Charlotte, only daughter of Colonel Davies of Nantcribba, in 1835 but she died in childbirth the following year. Widowed in autumn 1840, Rev. Mytton headed Llandyssil rectory's large household, comprising his second son, Devereux, his two daughters, Bridget and Elizabeth, and his motherless granddaughter, Charlotte, as well as one male and four female live-in servants, when the 1841 census was taken. Later in 1841, his younger daughter Elizabeth married the oldest son of Major Harrison of Caerhowell. John Mytton died in 1844, leaving 8-year-old Charlotte orphaned. At the time of the 1851 census, Rev. Mytton was 71 years old, and his household of seven included his unmarried children. Devereux (then curate assisting his aged father) and Bridget, plus one male and three female live-in servants. His concern about the welfare of his parishioners is illustrated by a press report of 1856 which named Rev. Mytton as one of two people providing more than six tons of coal to the poor of the parish. His opinion about the state of Llandyssil church building is unclear, but press reports show his willingness to support church building improvements elsewhere in the county. In 1839, aware of the need to provide increased church accommodation for Welshpool's growing population, both he and his younger son were

listed among the subscribers to the town's new church. In 1847, he subscribed to a fund to repair the fabric of, and build an extension to Llanidloes parish church.

Rev. Mytton died in December 1856 and was buried in Meifod. The press advertisements for the auction sale of his household and other property shed some light on his lifestyle. Two of his children died in 1858, Elizabeth in May and Devereux in June. On the death of her father, older daughter Bridget (1812-1910), who never married, moved to Malvern but returned to her native county and a home in Severn Street, Welshpool, before the 1881 census was taken. She was buried in Meifod, in the same grave as her brother Devereux.

NOTE: To answer those who have asked me where I find information for these newsletter contributions, it is mainly from the vast array of sources now available on the internet, supplemented by some previously-published printed works. Space precludes a complete list of references in each newsletter.

A Spirit Of Adventure



Olly spent his formative years in Llandyssil village. Being here from the age of two he had a wonderful village life. At that time there were about ten boys of the same age who played and roamed the area having so many adventures... one of the most memorable being when these ten-year-olds pinned-down Graham's flour delivery lorry with snowballs for nearly two hours - the drivers said it was one of the best days they had ever had.

Olly went to school locally, achieving good results... and then took to travelling the world evidencing 100% employment through the whole three years. After that, he started university, studying Product Design on a scholarship and went on to win a further scholarship after two years, to do work experience with Gillette... and that's when a neurological disease struck him down. Moving through years of being bed bound, after some ten years Olly made a partial recovery and, determined to recapture his life, went adaptive (disabled) skiing in Andorra. This is hideously expensive without your own kit and in true Olly form, he set out to make his own kit.

Recently exhibiting the fabulous ArcticFox sit-ski in the NEC Snow and Ski show, Olly drew lots of attention from all groups, particularly ski schools who wanted to broaden their remit. In this last year, Olly joined the Disabled Army Team in Colorado, making his own way there towing his equipment on a trailer behind him. As we speak, Olly is training for the World Championship Adaptive Surfing competition.

Nothing, but nothing, beats Olly and the only thing that has ever come near is the huge difficulty of travelling in a wheel chair. Many an airline 'forgets' to transport the wheelchair along with Olly and on one occasion his wheelchair was totally written off...with only minimal compensation. Olly is a pathfinder and an inspiration. I hope he will speak to the village someday!
